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## Impact Point Will Benefit Springboro Community

No less a personality than Oprah Winfrey is among those helping make Impact Point become a reality sometime in 2011. Impact Point is a planned community building that will serve the Academy at Minds In Motion on the school's Eleanor Drive campus.

"We hope to break ground this summer for the 7,200 square foot building," says the Gina Pangalangan, the school's founder, Principal, and Director of Education. Now, she wears a fund-raiser hat as well.

Oprah's inadvertent contribution came in late November. Gina and Tricia Fote, Director of Development, were in Oprah's television audience during the "Ultimate Favorite Things" show. They attended the show thinking they would be interviewed about the school. Instead, they came away with items that will be auctioned on ebay to raise funds for Impact Point. Unsold items will be auctioned at the school's Gala in March.

"Impact point will be a multi-purpose space for arts, fitness and community service. It also will house our enrichment classes and Saturday classes. Right now we don't have the room to accommodate outside students in our enrichment classes," says Gina.

As of the end of 2010, more than half the estimated \$700,000 building cost had been raised or pledged. The school also hopes to receive some construction grants.

Gina began the Academy five years ago with just 17 students in four grades. Today, there are about 110 students in kindergarten through eighth grade. The preschool component opened in 2002 and



has approximately 200 children. "Both schools have a waiting list."

"We started with the preschool and parents pushed me to offer a kindergarten program. I researched the requirements with the state and decided we could easily meet them, so we did it. The kindergarten was very successful and, again, parents urged me to add elementary classes," she recalls.

Gina started the independent, non-profit school at a time when she was struggling with educational placement issues with her own children. The certified teacher brought more than 20 years of teaching experience to the project. The underlying philosophy recognizes that children have different learning styles and learn best in a small classroom environment that allows them to explore their interests and develop a passion for learning. Much individual focus, and varied,

motivating enrichment activities enhance the curriculum.

Tom Harrison turned 60 this year and he works about 60 hours every week. Save your sympathy because Tom's work and passion are one and the same.



Tom and his wife, Shelly, opened the **Tom Harrison Tennis Center** on Commercial Way 14 years ago. It marked both the end of a long road and a new path for the Vietnam War veteran.

He was snagged by a tennis net on his road to college following his 1972 Army discharge. "A tennis pro asked me to help him teach and that got me started. I've been teaching tennis every since." He is USPTA certified and has taught for 30 years at area tennis and racquet clubs and the University of Dayton.

Since he loves coaching and enjoys kids, his path was set. "I learned a lot about the business side at the various clubs I worked. With Shelly's help, we opened our own tennis center."

Tom worked on plans for the center for five years and secured private financing for his two steel-framed, cloth-covered tennis courts. Currently, he teaches about 150 youngsters from Springboro and beyond, helped by his daughter, Emma Beckett, the assistant tennis pro.

Shelly serves as bookkeeper and Racquet Technician. Their younger daughter, Libby, earned a tennis scholarship to Bowling Green State University and is a dietitian with Atrium Medical Center.

## Extensive Retrofit Gives Thaler Machine a New Home, and Beverage Warehouse a New Lease on Life

If Thaler Machine Company decides on a company slogan it might be “**Still** made in the USA.”

Spurred by solid sales and cramped quarters, the 58-year-old precision machine company in September completed a retrofit of the former Anderson Beverage Company Building on Tahlequah Trail.

Pete Thaler set up a small machine shop in Dayton in 1952. The family-owned business expanded to a Miamisburg location in 1995. The Miamisburg site specialized in prototype, development, tool work, design, and inspection, while the Dayton shop focused on production machining. Now, Springboro is home to the functions and staff from both former locations.

The second and third Thaler generations now operate the business. Bill Thaler, Pete Thaler’s son, serves as company president. His son, Pete, is company vice-president.

With five acres at the new location, Thaler has room for expansion. The 80 full-time employees work three shifts and Pete anticipates adding up to 35 employees in the next few years.

During the extensive retrofitting, “I got on a first-name basis with lots of Springboro City officials,” says Pete. The challenge of retrofitting that much space for a process requiring precise temperature, humidity, electrical, computer, and other controls, could have been daunting.

“You need many more permits to transform a building for a new use, but everyone on the city staff was awesome to work with.” Given Thaler’s focus on aerospace and automotive clients, most areas of the transformed building could pass for surgical suites.

“When we acquired the Miamisburg facility it allowed us to expand into aerospace. At that time, 80 percent of our business was with the automotive industry. We diversified across the board. Today, if one industry is impacted, the impact on us is minimal. We’ve experienced growth across the board, despite the recession.”

According to its web site, [www.thalermachine.com](http://www.thalermachine.com), the company works with nickel alloy, titanium, composite, and other exotic materials and can machine parts to within a tiny fraction of the width of a human hair.

Thaler also manufactured Ultra Precision Parts for NASA’s James Webb Space Telescope, the successor to the Hubble Space Telescope and has been involved with Sandia National Laboratories in High Speed Machining Research.
