As we emerge from what we hope was the worst of the pandemic, we face new challenges and opportunities for growth. Our primary goal never waivers: maintaining Springboro's status as a premier community to live, work and raise a family. We do this by providing outstanding City services and amenities, fostering a safe and engaged community, keeping our business community strong and acting in a fiscally responsible manner.

In 2021, we continued to fight COVID, but we also continued to lead the way in programs and services. City Council voted to waive the May utility bill—including sewer, water and trash collection—for 6,200 households and businesses using ARPA stimulus funds. We offered Home Improvement Grants totaling \$100,000 to 23 residents in the Royal Oaks neighborhood, expanded public WiFi from Wright Station through Historic Springboro, and upgraded restrooms in three of our parks. We recognized the need for our homes and businesses to have access to high speed internet and invested \$2.4 million to bring fiber to every neighborhood.

As you review the Annual Report and Budget presentation, you'll notice conservative budgeting principles structured to provide efficient and quality services. Plans for 2022 include constructing a public parking lot behind Rotary Park, beginning safety and aesthetic upgrades at I-75/St. Rt. 73 interchange, and connecting Clearcreek Park to Hazel Woods Park with a multiuse trail.

Our focus remains on delivering core services while keeping your taxes low. We will invest in our roads, neighborhoods and historic downtown, support our business community and remain fiscally responsible.

We pledge to step up to new challenges and provide those services that are so important to you and your family.

City of Springboro, the Year in Review

2021 Facts, Figures and Highlights

- Third largest city in Warren County, with a population of 19,062 (2020 Census) Springboro experienced a 9 percent growth since the last Census
- Lowest Property Tax Rate in Warren County: 1.1 mils, and one of the lowest in the Miami Valley Region

Safety and Security

Our Police Department

- Saw continued downward trend in Criminal Incidents—about 9% lower than the peak in 2018. Criminal incidents, arrests, traffic enforcement and Calls for Service were also lower than pre-COVID years
- Achieved Gold level by the Lexipol Connect program for consistently and effectively disseminating policy updates to laws and ensuring officer training
- Collected a total of 172 pounds of pills and capsules in the Drug Drop Box, located in the Police Department lobby. More than 75 pounds were collected during the Drug Take Back Day in October. The drugs were destroyed by the DEA.

- Answered approximately 16,000 calls for service
- Encouraged discussion among residents by coordinating three community panel discussions about issues of race, bias and prejudice
- Accompanied Blue, the department's comfort dog, to numerous community events
- Co-coordinated Safety Town classes for youngsters entering kindergarten
- Maintained Boro Watch, a video camera safety registration program
- Coordinated Operation Santa, assisting 5 families and a total of 17 children

Smart City Initiative/ Technology Upgrades

- Fiber to Home project
- As part of the City's Fiber Master Plan, in partnership with the Warren County Port Authority, invested \$2.4 million to build a 17-mile broadband fiber network to provide high-speed internet service. The fiber network has attracted two Internet Service Providers (ISPs), giving Springboro residents a variety of options.
- Installed free public WiFi in Historic Downtown Springboro. Free WiFi is also available at Wright Station and City Building/Library parking lot
- Partnered with seven Miami Valley Communications Council cities to develop 35-mile high-speed fiber ring between the cities
- Installed three live streaming cameras to monitor traffic—with video feed available on our website



Added Big Belly waste and recycling collection cans at Kacie Jane Park and Wright Station

- Installed radar units for traffic safety/progression at nine intersections
- Offered Zoom appointments and online services from the Tax Office

Road/Infrastructure Improvements

- Resurfaced 22 streets (or a portion thereof) for 2.7 miles, including curb, sidewalk and driveway apron repairs
- Started East Street Parking lot construction project that will add 29 new parking spaces east of Rotary Park, completed by Summer 2022
- Replaced two 8' water mains—approximately 2,600 linear feet of water main
- Constructed a ten-foot-wide multi-use trail connecting E. Milo Beck Park to Clearcreek Park
- Added RRFB (Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon) at the crossing on Lytle-Five Points Road east of County Club Lane.
- Replaced two 36" culvert pipes under Pleasant Valley for storm water purposes

- Located water services and water mains for fiber installation project. All locate work continues to be done in-house instead of contracting outside services—saving the City thousands of dollars
- Battled 15 snow events in January and February, traveling 10,231 miles clearing roads in those two months
- Installed new decorative light poles with LED lights along S. Main Street

Parks Improvements and Projects

- Paved, striped and added parking blocks to the western side drive at Hazel Woods Park
- Created a multiuse path at E. Milo Beck Park that connects to Clearcreek Park
- Constructed a picnic shelter and restrooms at Gardner Park

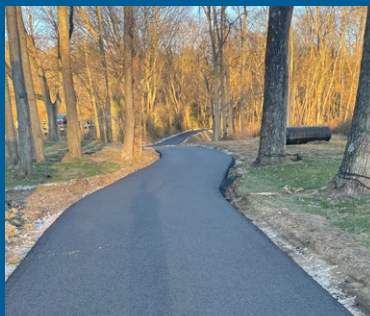

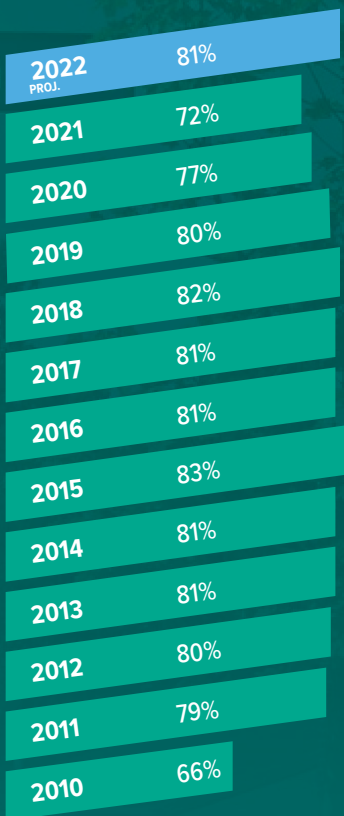
City Relying More on Income Tax

Springboro Property Tax Rate is Lowest in Region

Income tax generated from employee withholdings, taxes on the earnings of Springboro businesses and taxes paid by individuals—is the largest single source of revenue for the City, comprising 82 percent of the General Fund. As Columbus continues to cut funding to cities, Springboro has increased its reliance on local income tax revenue.

Income Tax Revenue

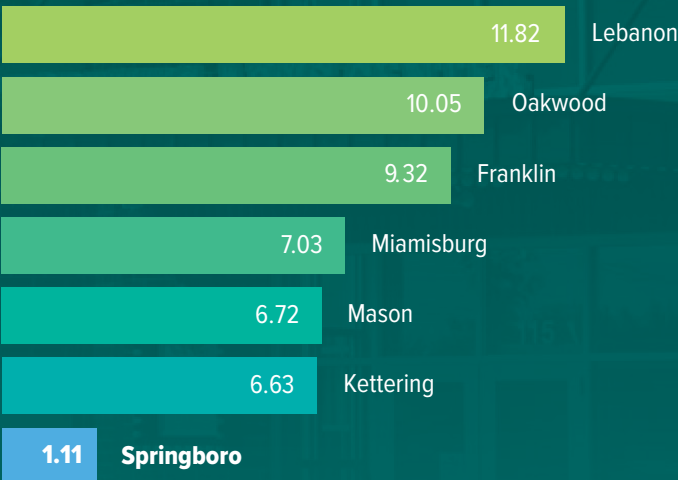
Percent of Income Tax Revenue from Total General Fund Revenue



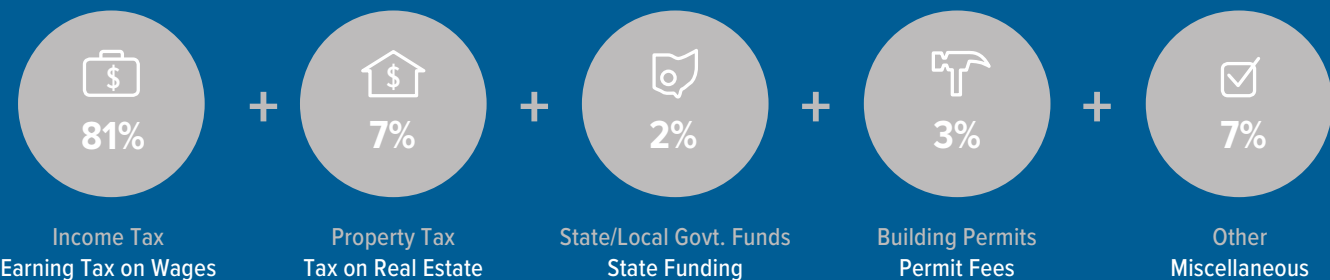
Our municipal property tax rate—at 1.11 mills—is the lowest in the region. Your Springboro municipal government realizes just over two cents from every property tax dollar collected. Of the balance, 73 cents support the schools, 18 cents are allocated to Clearcreek Township, Special Districts (Warren-Clinton Community Health, Warren County Health District and Franklin-Springboro Public Library) and the Warren County Career Center each receive about 4 cents and Warren County receives 3 cents.

With those tax dollars, your City protects its citizens and property, provides quality road maintenance and offers an array of quality-of-life features that truly make our community unique. As our City's landscape expands and changes, our residents and businesses can continue to expect quality services delivered in a professional manner.

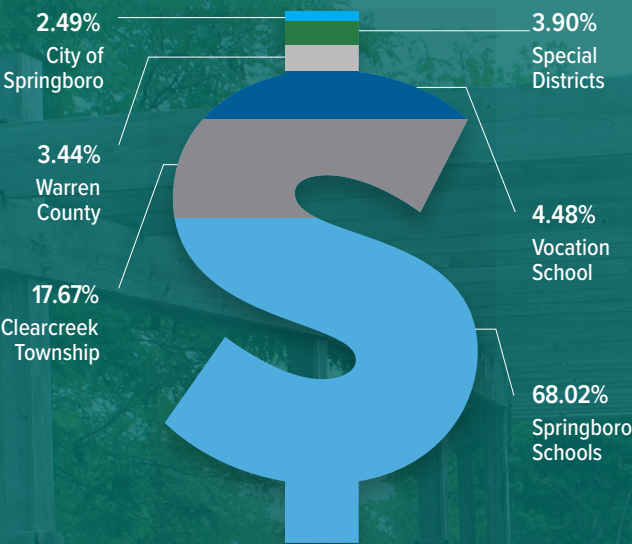
Property Tax Rate (In Mills) for South Suburban Cities

Property Tax Distribution



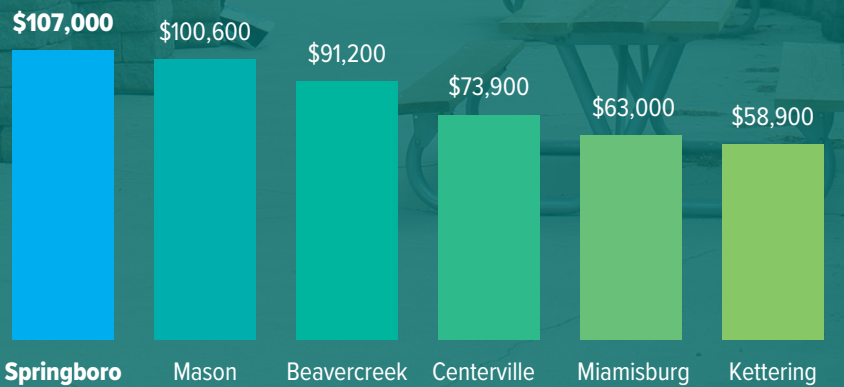
Springboro Has the Lowest Property Tax in the Region

State of the City ADDRESS

As presented by Mayor John Agenbroad

As **Mayor of Springboro**, I look forward each year to sharing some highlights of the progress we have made as a community and just a few reasons why I am incredibly proud to call Springboro home. How can I sum up 2021 without first thanking the many people involved in making Springboro the very best place to be in Ohio. **Our management team, employees and a dedicated corps of civic leaders make Springboro a leading community** in projects, programs and services that enhance the lives of our residents, support our schools as places to learn and grow and our businesses to prosper. Before commenting on the State of the City, I welcome back our four ward Council Members –Dale Brunner, Jim Chmiel, Jack Hanson and Janie Ridd– and congratulate them on their re-election. We look forward to continuing the great progress we have made as a team and their continued service and leadership.

LIFE IN SPRINGBORO

Life in Springboro is all about the quality and character of our community and that is why Springboro continues to be a top-ten rated City to live, work, play and raise a family. In fact, Springboro was rated #3 among the top 10 communities in the greater Southwest Ohio region by Cincy Magazine. Seventy-five communities were rated on factors such as safety, education, housing and tax rates, and Springboro outranked the communities of Wyoming, Indian Hill, Montgomery and Mason. **Springboro's median household income of \$107K is the highest by far in the Miami Valley region and the 14th highest in the State of Ohio**, indicating that our population is on average well educated and working in top job sectors. **Springboro also has the lowest property tax rate of all Warren County communities** receiving only 1.1 mills or about \$1 per \$1,000 of assessed value and our local income tax rate has not increased since 1988.

According to the 2020 census, our new population is **19,062 making Springboro the third largest city in Warren County**. We grew approximately 9% with 1,653 new residents. New projects and services over the past decade that continue to support our population include a new city building, a leaf collection program, a new intersection at SR73/SR741, a northbound ramp at SR73/I-75, at least four new parks, redevelopment of the former IGA corner, a performing arts center, a newly completed citywide fiber optic network, expanded community programming and countless top ratings.

In essence, Springboro appeals to everyone from young families to people looking for the perfect place to retire. **Our great neighborhoods, excellent schools, safety, services and amenities all contribute to Springboro's exceptional quality of life**. Springboro offers a variety of public programming that includes outdoor concerts, festivals and fireworks. Our residents enjoy bike and walking trails, an 18-hole public golf course, a **charming and vibrant historic district and 501 acres of parks**.



Springboro is also a business-friendly community committed to attracting quality commercial development and supporting the expansion of our existing businesses. From local to state development programs, we strive to provide assistance to businesses investing in Springboro and supporting our local economy. Springboro offers quality infrastructure and services including high-speed broadband internet access and is an ideal location for abundant employment and business opportunities.

Springboro's enduring qualities and tremendous success are predicated on a history of strong community leadership involving citizens working together to shape our community. **Our citizens share an amazing sense of community pride and are at the heart of making Springboro such a great place to live.**

FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

Springboro continues to be financially solvent despite the impact COVID has had on many local communities over the past two years. Our **conservative approach to budgeting and responsible management of reserves and debt** help to maintain our strong financial position and bridge the challenges created by the pandemic. In the past several years, the City has retired a significant portion of its debt as a cost saving measure. Most notably, the City has paid off its golf, water and sewer debt reducing interest payments by well over

\$500K, and by 2023, the City intends to pay off the majority of its current outstanding debt.

Springboro's 2022 budget remains focused on providing resident centered services including a robust street-paving program, quality public safety services, maintenance of public parks, continued upgrades to our water and sewer infrastructure and general community assistance. Simply put, our focus remains on the services our residents use every day such as police protection, drivable streets, clean, safe drinking water, a working sewer system and parks to play in.

Expenses are projected to be \$67M this year for capital and operations with stable year-end projections in total fund balances. Approximately \$16.3M is budgeted in our General Fund, the City's principal operating budget, with total General Fund revenues projected around \$20M. **The City's primary source of revenue is income tax, which comprises 80% of the General Fund revenue received.** Income tax collections are projected to be 4.5% above 2020 actuals, but slightly under anticipated 2021 collections. Revenue from water and sewer fees remain steady and we are not forecasting an increase in rates anytime soon.

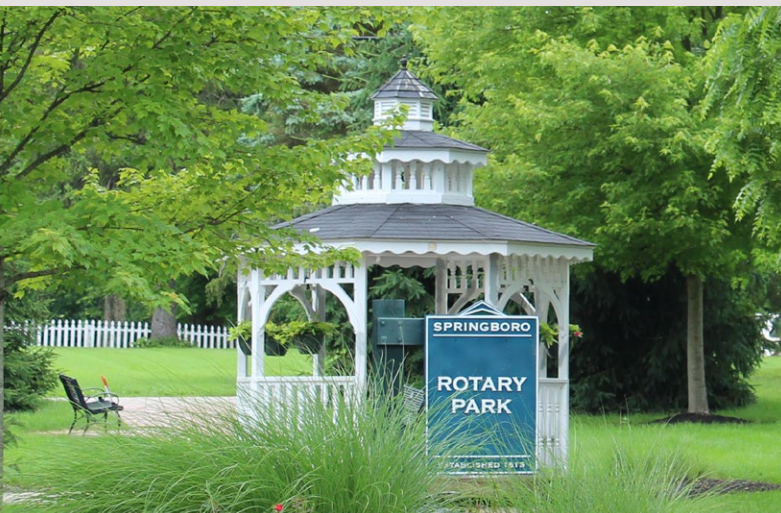
Springboro has received \$2 million in federal stimulus monies, which has been used for City purposes, schools and businesses within the community over the past two years. A total of \$760,000 was used to **directly assist our residents and businesses** in 2021 by waiving our May utility bill. This assistance provided some financial relief to 6,200 households and businesses. Based on feedback from residents, it really made a difference! We anticipate **receiving another \$900,000** this year and plan to augment that funding with other government grants to continue investing in infrastructure improvements, public safety and services that will positively impact the daily lives of our residents.

Springboro received all awards on our Comprehensive Annual Financial Report and a clean audit in 2021, again receiving a 4-Star rating under the State's Sunshine Law Star Rating System. This rating reflects the highest achievement in open and transparent government and confirms our continued commitment to fiscal accountability.

CAPITAL PLANNING

Our Capital Improvement Program (CIP) represents an investment in our community by planning short and long-range projects to address our immediate and future needs. The current economic environment is unique due to increased costs and delays due to COVID making it a difficult time to plan capital projects, but we have worked on a solid plan that reinvests in the City's existing assets and provides for some new assets and infrastructure.

This year's CIP proposes an **investment of \$43 million over the next five years**, an increase from the previous capital





budget of approximately \$19 million. This increase is in part a response to a survey conducted last year, which indicated that residents would consider water softening a benefit. Funding has been budgeted over the next several years to explore the design and construction of a potential water softening facility in Springboro. The capital program also includes a **40% increase in the street resurfacing budget** as a commitment to maintaining quality streets. CIP totals over the next five years show the bulk of the City's investments in core services like water, streets and parks, which are utilized by our residents every day and maintain our way of life.

It is important to note that **many of our capital projects are supported by grants**. In fact, the City has received grants from the state's last three capital budgets for new projects. In 2021, the City was awarded three transportation safety grants totaling \$3M with \$2.4M earmarked for the construction of the I-75/SR73 Interchange Safety Project. This fully funded project consisting of widening the roadway, adding turn lanes off the northbound ramp and other improvements will coincide with a Gateway Enhancement Project to make aesthetic improvements to the interchange. These projects will take place over the next three to four years in cooperation with the City of Franklin and will be managed by the Warren County Transportation Improvement District (TID). We thank the TID for their role in helping Springboro secure valuable grants to make these major transportation improvements in our community.

COMMUNITY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Springboro's Home Improvement Grant Program provides residents an opportunity to make needed exterior improvements to upgrade the safety and appearance of their homes. **Twenty-three grant applications were approved in 2021 with a total of \$100K in home improvement dollars pledged. In addition, the City recently completed a 17-mile broadband fiber network**, a \$2.4M investment in our community's digital technology in collaboration with the Warren County Port Authority. This technology upgrade will improve safety, service and quality of life for our residents by connecting our public



facilities and infrastructure and allowing private ISPs to bring fiber to homes giving residents new options for high-speed internet service. The **City realized a nearly 100% return** on this project when Point Broadband and Cincinnati Bell invested in the Springboro market. The City also continues to offer free public WiFi service in the community to help residents stay connected away from home. Local hotspots now include the City Building/Library campus, Wright Station and the Historic District, with plans to extend free WI-FI to all of our parks.

With **530 businesses** and potentially a dozen more opening in the near future, Springboro's thriving business economy provides the vital tax base needed to fund the services and amenities valued by our residents. In 2021, approximately 86,000 sq. ft. of new and expanded commercial space was approved for development and **25 new businesses opened** their doors. The new Kroger store on West Central Avenue opened last October following a major redevelopment of the former Kmart site, half of the potential commercial space at Wright Station has already been developed and a new parking area with at least 40 new visitor spaces was constructed last year. We originally anticipated it taking five to seven years for the corner to completely develop, but we are very excited about the progress that has been made in such a short time. Amenities such as the **DORA, free WiFi and outdoor entertainment** have enhanced the patron's experience at **Wright Station** while a full schedule of performances, speaker series, art exhibitions and community based programming has made our Performing Arts Center an entertaining and enriching destination.

Finally, Springboro **partners with organizations who advocate for businesses and promote economic growth** in local communities such as the Warren County Chamber Alliance, the Small Business Development Center and the Springboro Chamber of Commerce. These partnerships create opportunities for new businesses, provide a network of support and services for our business community and help us stay connected with policy makers in Columbus and Washington.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Springboro's park system features nine unique and beautiful parks where our residents can play, exercise, participate in sports and experience special events. Our park programming has exploded in the past several years with more **concerts, festivals, fireworks and fun opportunities** and we remain committed to making sure all of our residents have a reason to visit our many parks.

Park amenities include a **splash pad, dog park, amphitheater, veterans memorial and miles of paved walking paths**. Our residents also enjoy golfing at our very own course. Voted Dayton's Best Public Golf Course, Heatherwoode has earned high marks for outstanding course conditions, customer service and exclusive golf amenities. Approximately 40,000 rounds were played in 2021 (9 Holes-In-One!) with sales and revenue continuing to climb each year. We commend our entire golf course staff for making Heatherwoode such a valuable asset to our community.



CITY LEADERSHIP & SERVICE

Nearly 40 residents are appointed by Council to serve on citizen committees that focus on particular areas of community development such as land use planning, historic preservation and parks and recreation.

Recent committee highlights include the Architectural Review Board's 21st annual Historic Preservation Awards Program. This program recognizes individuals and groups for preserving Springboro's history through the preservation of buildings and artifacts as well as public education and awareness of our rich historical past. The board also reviewed over 25 cases for improvements to historic properties in the downtown area, which is a local and federally designated Historic District dating back to 1810.

Springboro celebrated 25 years as a Tree City USA in 2021 thanks to the ongoing efforts of the Tree Authority to preserve our City's trees and forests. Established in 1995, the Tree Authority ensures that Springboro continues to meet the standards required to earn this national distinction, which include an annual Arbor Day celebration, a tree ordinance and a community forestry budget of at least \$2 per capita to plant and grow trees throughout our City.

Springboro's Park Board continues to make our parks **fun, healthy outdoor spaces** for everyone to enjoy. The Park Board oversees programs and improvements such as shelters, athletic fields, walking paths and play areas at our nine beautiful parks. Our Park Board Members and City Staff outdid themselves in 2021 by coordinating and sponsoring **11 free concerts at North Park** attended by approximately 21,000 music fans making it a landmark year for our popular "Concerts in the Park" program.

The Planning Commission reviewed plans for development and redevelopment projects in 2021 ranging from the new Kroger development on West Central Avenue to multiple buildings in the commercial area of Advanced Drive and other retail buildings throughout the community. This year, the Planning Commission reviewed a recommendation to **revise the City's Master Plan** last updated in 2009. A draft of the new plan was completed through the work of a steering committee of area community leaders. Springboro residents were invited to participate in the process at two public open houses and through on-line surveys, which gathered close to 1,000 responses. The City's new Master Plan was adopted in February to guide the long-range growth, development and redevelopment of the community over the next 10 years.

Finally, our Bicycle & Pedestrian Advisory Committee and City Staff continue working on the implementation of **The Central Greenway Project**, which will ultimately connect six City parks, neighborhoods and business districts. A multi-use **trail connector from E. Milo Beck Park to Clearcreek Park** was completed in 2021 after receiving \$250,000 in grant funding through the State of Ohio. Design work has begun on another



multiuse trail that will connect Clearcreek Park to Hazel Woods Park funded in part by a \$150,000 grant. The BPAC's efforts to promote **biking in our community** include locally sponsored bike rides and bicycle education workshops as well as events like Bike the Boro, which attracted almost 300 riders last year.

These are some of the many initiatives carried out by our citizen committees, and we thank all of our volunteers for another year of outstanding service.



PUBLIC SAFETY

Public Safety is a #1 priority in Springboro. Our Police Department of 31 officers in patrol, investigations, supervisory and command staff strive to provide **exceptional service and protection** to our community and are dedicated to **the safety and welfare** of our citizens. The department's Communications Center also operates seven days a week and received approximately 16,000 calls for service last year.

Police programs such as 'Boro Steet Watch and our School Resource Officers promote community safety within our neighborhoods and schools. Last year, the D.A.R.E. Program encouraged 1,472 students in our elementary and intermediate schools to live safe and healthy lives.

Community outreach programs such as **Operation Santa** and the department's **comfort dog, Blue**, assist Springboro families in need or in crisis. The Operation Santa program assisted five families with a total of 17 children in December by providing gifts and holiday cheer. Officer Blue visited schools, nursing homes and appeared at community events providing comfort and reassurance for many of our community members.

The Police Department also sponsored three community panel discussions this past year to **facilitate open communication and encourage discussion** among residents concerning issues of race, bias and prejudice. Citizens, police officers, prosecutors and judges shared their experiences and perspectives on these important issues within local communities and the justice system.

Staying connected with the members of our community remains an integral part of our approach to policing and these programs would not be successful without the support of our residents. Thank you to our officers for keeping Springboro a **top rated city in safety services**.

In closing, Springboro is my home and the community that I have loved and served for the past 25 years. On behalf of City Council, we simply promise to do our best to fulfill our duty as your elected officials and work together to represent the citizens of Springboro. Our many wonderful citizens make it a pleasure to serve as Mayor and I hope 2022 brings you hope, health and happiness! Thank you for another great year!
