Chris Judge enjoyed a successful 15-year career as an educator, both in the classroom and as an administrator. Almost four years ago, he opened a Springboro office at 15 S. Main Street.

Chris explains why he opened the Springboro office, saying, "I tutored many students from this area and more and more parents urged me to open a Springboro office. After some research and location searching, we opened here." Now Chris has begun considering a third location in the north Dayton area.

As with many small businesses, SEC started small. "I began tutoring in students' homes, but I quickly became very busy and realized we needed a physical office setting," he recalls. He tutors many students himself and has staff of about 32 hand-picked area teachers who also work with students." Parents want tutors they can trust with their students. Background checks, both local and FBI, are standard for us. Many of our tutors teach full time in area school districts. "Often, parents or educators in a district will recommend a teacher to me," Chris says, adding, "The background checks are important. I have to be able to look at a parent and say, 'yes, your child is safe here.'"

Today, the strong emphasis on the ACT has become an increased component of Sugarcreek's services. The ACT, American College Testing, debuted in the 1950s, successfully challenging the primacy of the SAT, Scholastic Aptitude Test. Many parents view ACT preparation classes as essential for their children, and ACT Preparation services have become a cottage industry. It's not unusual for students to take the ACT several times. "Overall, we see our students' scores increase by two to six points.

During Spring 2017, the City in conjunction with the Warren County Transportation Improvement District (TID), will be embarking on a major reconstruction project of the intersection of SR 73 (Central Avenue) and SR 741 (Main Street). This \$10 million project, with approximately \$4 million in state and MVRPC support, will enhance the current operation of the intersection.

Three "legs" of the intersection will be widened (north, east and west) to accommodate two turn lanes in each direction. Stacking lanes will be lengthened to accommodate the increased traffic during the peak AM and PM driving times. Landscaping and hardscape will be added to the intersection to promote better aesthetics to create a nicer gateway to the Historic Downtown. (A few improvements will also be made to the south leg on the intersection, however those improvements will only be completed in the northernmost block of South Main Street due to the limitations of the Historic District.)

Construction is expected to last until mid-2018. While the construction may delay your deliveries, your employees (or you), who would happen to use the intersection on a daily basis, the new intersection is expected to help your "on-time" deliveries and hopefully get customers to your businesses that much faster!

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
Parents know that higher ACT scores will increase the chances of a scholarship or financial aid."
